First Nations Zero Waste Ambassador Program

This program aims to promote a regenerative lifestyle, and to support your zero waste journey with practical tools, and concrete actions. The program includes five on-site sessions, and it can be customized.

It also provides environmental curriculum resources for K-12 students through science and arts-based approaches, guided by Traditional Ecological Knowledge, enabling sensory and cognitive development, contributing towards a circular economy and regenerative practices.



Session 1

Conduct a waste audit, create a baseline and plan an effective waste diversion program.



Session 2

Learn unique painting and upcycling art techniques. Create an upcycled art project with recycled materials. Learn about different types of waste, landfills and their environmental impacts.



Session 3

Create a vermicompost system using organic waste. Observe earthworms' anatomy, and behavior. Learn about the microbiology of the soil.



Session 4

Learn about different gardening techniques to grow vegetables. Apply regenerative practices. Make soil amendments, and extracts from earthworms poop (castings), and compost.



Session 5

Conduct a waste audit to compare it with the baseline and to calculate waste diversion rate achieved.
